VII PRESENTATIONS:

A Social Work:

Instructor Dan Hall and Dean Jessica Van Slooten presented an update on the social work program. The presentation slides are attached.

Discussion was held about the qualifications needed to teach social work courses at Bay and networking opportunities with counseling staff at Bay Pines Center through Terri Mileski.

Wendy Middaugh emphasized the importance of continuing education beyond the Associate of Arts degree for careers in social work and the value of internships. The shortage of licensed counselors is getting attention at the state and federal levels, resulting in funding support becoming available to social work students and programs.

B <u>Early Childhood</u> <u>Education</u>:

Instructor Tammra Houseman presented an update on the early childhood education program. The presentation slides are attached.

Tammra responded to a question about how CTE students at the ISDs enter our program. CTE early childhood education students need not take Bay's Foundations course, and some have completed part or all the CDA credential at the ISD before they come to our program. Bay has some direct credit courses with the DIISD and DSISD.

Bay is the only nationally accredited (NAEYC) early childhood education teacher preparation program in the Upper Peninsula and the only competency-based education (CBE) program in the state.

VIII PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

President Hughes reported:

Organizational Changes:

The Student Services and Student Success departments will be combined under one name, "Student Affairs." The reorganization will reshape the student experience by streamlining processes and realigning the reporting structure between Vice President of

Student Services Travis Blume and Dean of Student Success Amy Gibbs. Soft changes will begin July 1, 2024, and the complete shift completed by January 1, 2025.

Official title changes for Dr. Amy Reddinger from Vice President of Arts & Sciences, Diversity, Equity, & Belonging to Vice President of Academic Affairs & Educational Equity and for Cindy Gallagher from Vice President of Business, Technology, Allied Health & Workforce Development to Vice President of Workforce Innovation & Strategic Partnerships will be effective July 1. The shift in their responsibilities will allow Amy to focus on academic programs and partnerships to position the College for growth and Cindy to focus on developing strategic partnerships between Academics and Business and Industry through building those relationships with Deans and subject matter experts (faculty).

MI Reconnect: Strong enrollment in the MI Reconnect tuition assistance program

continues. Bay will participate in statewide efforts to celebrate the

MI Reconnect graduates.

Hanover Research: Hanover Research completed a regional needs analysis based on

Bay's IPEDS data and will review the report with the Senior

Leadership Team on May 22.

Technology Needs
Assessment:

Ferrilli will conduct Phase II of the contract to assist in writing a Request for Proposal (RFP) for an Enterprise Resource Program (ERP) that supports a student management system and other operational pieces. The RFP is expected to go out over the

summer.

Dean Position: The Dean of Business and Technology position to replace Mark

Highum upon his retirement on June 30, is in process.

Leadership Conference: Twenty-three students from various companies in Dickinson

County, including Bay employees Taylor Barron and Evelyn Norkoli, graduated from the eight-month Bay College Leadership Academy on April 18. Michele Campbell, Manager of Business Development, plans and oversees the Academy each year. Dr. Nerita Hughes, Dr. Amy Reddinger, and Dr. Crystal Hendrick represented the College as breakout speakers during the Leadership Conference, the capstone event of the Leadership

Academy open to the public.

UPTLC: The 2024 Upper Peninsula Teaching and Learning Conference

(UPTLC) was hosted by the College in Escanaba this week. There were 110 attendees at the pre-conference on May 13 and 160 attendees at the conference on May 14. Feedback on the

conference was very positive.

BPA: Instructor Brent Madalinski attended the Business Professionals of

America (BPA) National Leadership Conference in Chicago, IL with

students from May 10-14.

Celebration: Librarian Mariel Carter organized a graduation party for student

workers on May 1.

Awards Celebration: The Awards Celebration was held on April 16. Thanks were

extended to trustees who attended.

Community's College: The Escanaba campus hosted 53 events in April resulting in 284

event hours, an estimated attendance on campus of 909 people, ~\$2500 in revenue without catering and ~\$9,000 in catering revenue. This is what being the community's college is about.

ATD ICAT 2.0: Our Achieving the Dream Coach encouraged our investment in

their Institutional Capacity Framework and Assessment Tool (ICAT) which will help us look at all facets from academics to operations (e.g., space, capacity) to expand data informed decisions. A cost estimate is being prepared with anticipation of instituting it in the fall. This tool will further support the work of

strategic planning and Caring Campus initiatives.

Enrollment: Summer enrollment is up compared to this time last year.

Enrollment for the academic year is relatively flat. Our ability to maintain and slowly increase enrollment is good news compared to

most other schools experiencing declines in enrollment.

The program updates to the Board have provided information on opportunities to invest. The social work program is a good example

of a true 2+2 transfer program.

Transfer partnerships will be strengthened with NMU and other institutions to improve retention and maintain enrollment. Bay's programs will be reviewed to prepare students for where they need

to be through transfer or career preparation.

IX **BUSINESS OFFICE REPORT:**

Lynn Martinson, VP of Finance & Operations, reported that she is working on budget information requested at the board retreat and will provide that information soon.

Lynn is also working through some questions on the Examination of Financial Forecast Services being prepared by Forvis for the USDA loan application for additional student housing.



Social Work: Community Needs


- The close to home data from the previous slide paints the picture of the need for us, as a college, to make sure that we are creating educational programs that are going to answer community needs. The needs of rehabilitation and mental health are great. To further illustrate this here is one quote from Bridge Michigan last year:
- "Nearly two full years 728 days, to be precise. That's how long ago Pathways Community Mental Health, headquartered here in this Upper Peninsula city, posted its "help wanted" for a social worker in its Escanaba branch. ... The shortage is so bad that at least three of the agency's existing social workers pile into the agency's cars nearly every day of the week to make the 67-mile journey south to sit in therapy with clients in Escanaba." -Bridge Michigan 2023 In Michigan mental health crisis, a tug-of-war over too few social workers | Bridge Michigan

Social Work Enrollment 2020-2024




Social Work Retention 2020-2023










Workforce Needs: Early Education






ECE Enrollment 2018-2023




All Education Enrollment Comparison by Age, 2018-2023
